Well, we've officially arrived in our song at the moment the Old Testament believers could only hope for – the arrival of our long-awaited Messiah, Jesus Christ. Oh, isn't it such a privilege as a New Testament believer to be able to celebrate the arrival of our Immanuel each Advent season? The Israelites lived their lives in eager expectation, in joyous hope of their coming Messiah. No, they weren't perfect at it. In fact, they messed it up quite a bit, didn't they? Even in Haggai 2, they were struggling to rebuild the temple – impatient and discouraged. But aren't we often like the Israelites? In our own eager expectation, don't we often mess up our own waiting process? But God is always teaching something in the waiting. We have much to learn from the periods where God tells us simply to wait.

The Lord promised that His glory would fill the temple. And, oh how his temple was filled with awesome glory! Jesus filled God's earth with His glory and power. Born to a virgin mother, He was a miracle from the start. Throughout His life, He continually amazed us with His glory, performing miracles and showing us the path to His Father. Even in His resurrection, Jesus overcame death. The Lord, in Haggai, speaks of shaking all the nations: "the heavens and the earth, the sea and the dry land." We must never underestimate the reach of God. He is sovereign over all things. He can, and does, control all things here on earth and in heaven. Jesus' birth, reign on earth, and resurrection impacts <u>all</u> things.
