'Be strong, all you people of the land,' declares the Lord, 'and work. For I am with you,' declares the Lord Almighty.

God reassures the Israelites in Haggai 2:4b, and Jesus reassures us in Matthew 28:20b that He is with us always. We are never alone. There is such comfort and hope in that truth. The word hope throughout many verses in the Bible comes from the Hebrew word qavah, which means "to bind together (perhaps by twisting)," coming from the word for cord. When we think of our hope in Jesus, we can bind together with Him and are left so much stronger than on our own. In binding with Jesus, we see a required action on our part. Hope isn't just simply waiting; it's actively binding with Jesus while we wait. Hold onto your end of the rope and feel the strength in the tension of Jesus holding His end of the rope as well. Hold onto hope.

Are you actively binding yourself to Jesus? What does that look like in your daily life? In what areas might you be dropping your end of the rope?

Throughout the entire Good News of the Bible, we see God has always been there. He is always with us in our current times, and He will come again.
